

APA 6th examples

APA style includes:

- An **in-text citation** in your document to briefly identify the source you have quoted or paraphrased:
 - **Direct quotation** – put double quotation marks around the quote and include page numbers e.g. “social psychology’s most important lesson concerns the influence of our social environment” (Myers, 2014, p. 105).
 - **Paraphrasing/summarising** – page numbers don’t need to be included, e.g. Research (Kramer, 2013) indicates that ...
OR Research by Kramer (2013) suggests ...
- A **Reference List** for all in-text citations on a separate page at the end of your document.

NB: Separate the final name from the rest with a comma and an ampersand.

NB: Include the first six author’s names, then insert three dots and add the last author’s name.

Journal articles *Note: format authors the same as for books*

Electronic version with DOI	(Todorova, Bear, & Weingart, 2014)	(Todorova et al., 2014)	Todorova, G., Bear, J. B., & Weingart, L. R. (2014). Can conflict be energizing? A study of task conflict, positive emotions, and job satisfaction. <i>Journal of Applied Psychology</i> , 99(3), 451-467. http://dx.doi.org/10.1037/a0035134 NB: Include the doi number. This alpha-numeric code usually appears on the first page of the article.

For sources that you have not actually read but which are referred to in another work, list the secondary source (the source you have read) in the Reference List. In-text, name the original work and give a citation for the secondary source.

In-text: Bennett (as cited in Stone, 2013) defined ...

Reference List: Stone, R. J. (2013). *Managing human resources*. (4th ed.). Milton, Australia: Wiley.
