What is Psychological Science?

Psychology is the scientific exploration of human cognition, behaviour, emotions, personality, developmental processes, motivation, and life experiences. This field encompasses a wealth of knowledge derived from research, which underpins its application in various professional contexts, utilising psychological expertise across diverse domains and environments.

What will I learn?

UC's BPsycSc offers a robust foundational psychology core that aligns with the standards of other international undergraduate psychology curricula; whilst being anchored in a New Zealand context. The degree allows students to learn about the breadth of disciplines in psychology so they can make a more informed choice about their future area of focus and be more knowledgeable in their future careers.



Study Psychological Science and you will:

- Participate in Work Integrated Learning activities that give you access to the skills, knowledge, and behaviours to enable successful transition to the workplace.
- Understand the influence of global conditions on your discipline and engage competently with global and multicultural contexts.
- Gain an understanding of global awareness and local roots, by supporting you to reflect on how your own context affects how you engage with the world.
- Understand the subjectivity of your own culture that contributes to developing inclusivity and open-mindedness.
- Develop an understanding of your own local context in a global world.
- Gain exposure to the latest research, derived locally and internationally.

Within your degree you must select one of the following minors:

Students can also take an additional minor from other selected subjects in the BSc, BA, BCom and BHSc.

What is the difference between this degree and a BA/BSc/BHSc?

The Bachelor of Psychological Science degree program is structured with a core focus on psychology, supplemented by a psychology minor, and offers students the flexibility to opt for either a second psychology minor, a minor from a related discipline, or a selection of electives from cognate disciplines.

Studying psychology through a BA/BSc/BHSc allows for a broader field of study.

Work Integrated Learning (WIL) experiences merge theoretical learning with hands-on practice in a professional setting. While WIL is optional for all UC students, it's already integrated into the BPsycSc curriculum for a more concentrated learning experience.
