1. Aronga | Purpose

This scholarship recognises and supports undergraduate students who demonstrate alignment to UC's commitment to producing students who are engaged, empowered, and prepared to make a difference, as they begin their studies at Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha University of Canterbury in the 150th year of the University. The scholarship aims to broaden the pool of students who receive financial support from the University, by recognising applicants with a demonstrated and significant commitment to creating positive change in the world.

2. Paearu māraurau | Eligibility criteria

- 2.1 Applicants must be citizens of Aotearoa New Zealand or holders of Aotearoa New Zealand residence class visas.
- 2.2 In the year of application, applicants must have attended a decile 1–7 school² in Te Waipounamu South Island.

3. Tukanga tononga | Application process

Applications must be made online at the Scholarships website³ by 15 August.

4. Tukanga kōwhiringa | Selection process

- 4.1 150 scholarships are available annually.
- 4.2 The scholarship is awarded by Te Kaunihera | University Council on the recommendation of a selection committee comprising:
 - a. the Tumu Whakarae | Vice-Chancellor (or nominee);
 - b. the Amokapua Pākākano Tuarua | Deputy Assistant Vice Chancellor Māori (or nominee);
 - c. the Director of Student Wellbeing (or nominee); and
 - d. the Kaiwhakahaere Tartitari | Director of Recruitment (or nominee).

5. Paearu kōwhiringa | Selection criteria

- 5.1 In making the recommendations, the selection committee gives equal consideration to the following:
 - a. Commitment to creating positive change in the world, aligned to UC's commitment to grow students who are prepared to make a difference. Positive change in the world can include cultural, economic, environmental, political, and/or social gains.
 - b. Engagement with the community who will benefit from the desired positive change in the world, aligned to UC's commitment to grow students who are engaged.
 - c. Personal resilience and fortitude necessary to complete an undergraduate degree, aligned to UC's commitment to grow students who are empowered.⁴
- 5.2 If, in any year, there are fewer candidates of sufficient merit than there are scholarships available, fewer scholarships are offered.

6. Mahere utu | Value and payment schedule

- 6.1 The scholarship covers tuition fees for courses in an undergraduate degree programme, for up to 135 points of enrolment per annum during the academic year and the summer school period.¹ This includes the standard undergraduate course loading of 120 points, but it also allows for, in each year of tenure, the taking of one additional course (which must count towards the degree plan) or for a single resit.
- 6.2 The scholarship is paid to the recipient's University fees account in all the years that fees are payable by the recipient for the qualifying degree programme. If, in any year, a recipient is entitled to Fees Free or to receive an additional scholarship that pays tuition fees, that entitlement takes precedence in payment of a recipient's tuition fees.

7. Paearu here | Tenability and retention criteria

- 7.1 The scholarship must be taken up in Semester One of the year following the year of application.
- 7.2 The scholarship is tenable during a recipient's full-time enrolment at the University in a programme for an undergraduate bachelor's degree: three years in the case of three-year bachelor's programmes and four years in the case of four-year bachelor's programmes.
- 7.3 The scholarship is not co-tenable with any other experiential award that is funded by UC⁵. It is co-tenable with any other award unless the conditions of the other award preclude this.
- 7.4 During tenure recipients are expected to satisfactorily engage with the academic support programme provided as part of the scholarship⁶.
- 7.5 If, during tenure, a recipient's enrolment no longer meets the conditions specified in clause 7.2, the scholarship may be withdrawn, and any paid funds may be recovered.
- 7.6 The scholarship may be withdrawn, and any paid funds may be recovered if, during tenure, the recipient does not:
 - a. maintain an enrolment that meets the conditions specified in clause 7.2;
 - b. maintain satisfactory academic engagement⁷ and progress;⁸ and
 - c. adhere to the University's statutes, regulations, policies, and rules.

8. Whakamahuki | Background information

Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury established the scholarship in 2022 to mark the 150th anniversary of the University's establishment.

The scholarship's name, *Te Kakau a Māui Scholarship*, is inspired by the many feats and achievements that the Polynesian demi-god Māui achieved. Despite the trials and tribulations that Māui faced as the pōtiki amongst his siblings, his notoriety as a troublemaker, his superhero deeds, and the impact he had on society as a change-maker have been recorded in oral traditions right across the vast Te Moana-nui-a-Kiwa Pacific Ocean. Many of the narratives of Māui and his deeds mention the different tools that he used, with a kakau (hafted handle of a toki) being one. Despite being just a handle, the kakau had other tools from a variety of materials lashed to it, based on the needs of Māui at the time. The kakau was so important to Māui that it has also been recorded in our night sky, with *Te Kakau a Māui* being one name associated with the constellation Orion.

In alignment with the wider narratives of the stars and navigation incorporated across Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury, *Te Kakau a Māui Scholarship* was selected as an ideal name for the scholarship that commemorates the 150th anniversary of the founding of the University. Similarities can be drawn between Māui and many of our students, as well as between a kakau and a scholarship. Like Māui, many of our students will have to overcome trials and tribulations to achieve their dreams and aspirations. Some will be the first in their whānau to pursue tertiary studies. And a scholarship can be likened to a tool, such as a kakau, that enables students to achieve those dreams and aspirations. As opposed to giving students a set of exquisitely crafted tools to enable their success, providing a toki handle signifies the need for students to take ownership of their journey, to use it wisely, and, most importantly, to treat the scholarship as a hand-up, not a hand-out.

- Connecting with the Success Coach a minimum of 2 times per term. This could be at any of the Whanaungatanga, Success or Careers sessions or additional 1-1 sessions and can include virtual attendance.
- Attending all whole cohort events on campus (up to 3 each year).
