Have I delivered on my promise to my readers?

Are all my points relevant?

Has someone else read my work to check if it makes sense?

- reduce / cut (sentence level)
- break up long sentences
- check formality, vocabulary
- check presence of references

Am I expressing my ideas clearly?

Can I make my writing more concise (i.e. use fewer words to say the same thing)?

Have I used appropriate academic style?

Is there any repetition I can remove?

Have I referenced all my sources?

Have I read my work aloud?

#### proofread whakatikahia

- perform the 3-stage proofreading process
- create a style sheet
- check spelling, punctuation, grammar and capitalisation
- check formatting of references

Is my work formatted correctly (line spacing, headings, paragraph demarcations, font, etc.)?

Are my references formatted according to my subject's style guide or lecturer's / supervisor's instructions?

Are there any other errors or inconsistencies in my work?

#### What is the difference between editing and proofreading?

Editing is a *subjective* process: it requires you to make stylistic and structural decisions. Proofreading is *objective*: it involves finding and correcting errors. Often writers will edit and proofread simultaneously, but you should always carry out a final proofread before you submit your work.

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
