The Vice-Chancellor is assisted by Te Ohu Whakahaere Senior Leadership Team, comprised of leaders from the University's faculties and major service units who are responsible for management of their areas and leadership of the University as a whole.

Te Poari Akoranga Academic Board

The University's principal academic body, Poari Akoranga | Academic Board coordinates the faculties and is responsible for advising the University Council on all academic matters. It has authority to make recommendations and reports on matters including research, courses of study, students, bursaries and scholarships, prizes and examinations.

Thesis descriptions

Sayed Ahmed

Food Security and Social Entrepreneurship: An Investigation into the Bangladesh Agripreneurial Ecosystem

The thesis investigates the role of social entrepreneurship in addressing food security in developing economies like Bangladesh. Findings show that Bangladesh has a long way to go to achieve food security. Agripreneurs are essential players in the local food ecosystems and require pertinent support to maintain food production. Access to finance, training, markets, and improved infrastructure were identified as crucial elements in the local food ecosystem. The study underscores the importance of sustainable production practices and proposes policy changes, public-private partnerships, and joint ventures to enhance food security, income, and economic well-being in rural areas.

Swathy Akhil

Synthesis and Characterisation of diamidinium and allyldiamidinium ionic liquids

The thesis investigates the synthesis and properties of novel diamidinium and allyldiamidinium ionic liquids, revealing their physical characteristics and thermal behaviours. Utilizing standard methods like NMR and MS, the compounds compositions are elucidated, while their melting points, viscosities, and solubilities are explored. Thermal analyses unveil solid-state tendencies and varying stabilities. Crystal structures of select compounds are reported. Additionally, the thesis delves into the synthesis and characterization of palladium-coordinated diamidinium compounds, highlighting their solid nature and favourable thermal stability.

The study provides insights into a diverse range of ionic liquids and their potential applications.

James Hadley Bridson

The presence and release of plastic additives in microplastic pollution: An Aotearoa New Zealand perspective

Plastic materials are an intrinsic part of modern society due to their favourable properties, ease of manufacture, and low cost. Their properties can be easily tuned by incorporating plastic additives which impart features such as colour or flexibility. However, plastics are inevitably released into the environment. Plastic pollution is known to have detrimental environmental impacts; the extent and mechanisms of which are still unclear, but plastic additives are thought to play a key role. This thesis seeks to further understand the identity, concentration, behaviour, and transformation of plastic additives to help elucidate the environmental risk of marine plastic pollution.

Elizabeth Rowellyn Brown

Intertwining Leadership and Change to Embed Te Tiriti o Waitangi Within a University

This study investigated the drivers and mechanisms for bicultural change and leadership within a university, and sought to acknowledge the issues and challenges, opportunities and successes that arose for academic staff as they developed their bicultural competence and confidence, and leadership within a tertiary education context. In New Zealand, the indigenising of education is premised on Te Tiriti o Waitangi the founding partnership document of the nation signed in 1840. The study contributes to leading and

implementing bicultural change within a university setting and how a Te Tiriti-based relationship is manifested. Specifically, it examined how the wider institutional context created conditions for change in initial teacher education programmes.

Siobhan Alana Campbell

Investigating the impact of broad-spectrum micronutrients as a treatment for antenatal depression on infant behaviour and temperament in the first year of life.

Antenatal depression is a risk factor for poor infant outcomes, and broad-spectrum micronutrients (BSM) have shown efficacy in treating psychiatric symptoms in non-pregnant populations. However, the effects of BSM on neonatal development and infant temperament are unknown. Two studies were conducted within a sample of 123 infants to investigate the influence of a BSM intervention given to pregnant mothers for the treatment of antenatal depression on infant neurobehaviour and temperament. Results showed that BSM exposure appears to mitigate risks of depression on infant outcomes, showing positive infant behaviour on par or better than typical pregnancies and superior to antidepressants.

Makayla Szu-Yu Chen

The Attentional White Bear Effect: Exploring Constraints and its Time Course

The Attentional White Bear effect refers to increased attention to an expected distractor location relative to an empty location. This phenomenon is commonly interpreted within a process-all framework, guiding attention to all

expected stimuli regardless of task relevancy. This study found that attentional control and learned attentional set jointly influence this effect, and that attentional control suppresses attention to distractors only under high task demand. Importantly, this effect was neither spatially nor temporally specific, and the effect does not require the distractors having an abrupt onset. These results demonstrate the flexibility of the visual system, and the distractor processing is the result of active attentional allocation to all expected stimuli.

Tracy Julia Clelland

Parents as Sexuality Educators: Negotiating Uncertainty, Risk, and Possibilities.

This thesis focuses attention on the broader sexuality education landscape in New Zealand, where discourses of health and education inform parents' sexuality education practices. While participants were worried about how to protect their children from sexual harm, most participants recognised their children as sexual agents. Moreover, they were critical of the moralistic and risk-based approaches that informed their childhood experiences. My analysis highlights a need for reframing the 'parent as sexuality educator' through a relational ontology – as a shared educational process that embraces educational uncertainty about knowledge and the subject-ness (Biesta, 2022) of children in the present moment.

Keri Louise Darrock

Evaluation of Airway Protection using Citric Acid Cough Testing

This research programme explored the administration of cough testing and revealed key considerations for the interpretation of results. A scoping review highlighted the issues with current variability in protocols. In examining the effect of citric acid presentation order on cough thresholds, novel limitations of current methods were identified, including the current definition of a cough threshold. In exploring the use of cough testing in the clinical management of patients with swallowing disorders, findings indicated a need for clinicians to have a greater theoretical understanding around sensation in the context of airway protection for swallowing.

Daniela De Seixas Grimberg

Impact of Information Disorder and Digital Populism on journalistic practices: A study on the Brazilian press under Bolsonaro's influence

The thesis discusses the effects of online disinformation and hostility against the press on the journalistic practices of mainstream news outlets in Brazil under the administration of former far-right president Jair Bolsonaro (2019-2022), a period marked by a decline in press freedom in the country, with journalists facing disinformation campaigns, restricted access to official data and harassment. It sets out to understand elements of populist anti-press rhetoric and its interference in journalistic practices. It explores two sets of data: a content analysis of Bolsonaro's anti-press messages on Twitter (X), and interviews with mainstream journalists approaching their experiences in the period, evidencing the adaptations required in their work routines. Both analyses point to transformations in how the press approaches digital populism and reveal that the targeting of individual journalists makes their role central to those changes.

Tessa Rose Donaldson

Calming Overwhelming Present Emotions: C.O.P.E Design, Testing and Efficacy of a Children's Emotion Regulation App.

Emotion regulation functions as a protective factor that influences psychological and behavioural outcomes for children and adolescents. This thesis presents the research, design, development, and efficacy testing of a children's emotion regulation digital application titled C.O.P.E: Calming Overwhelming Present Emotions. Four studies were conducted to develop C.O.P.E including a meta-analysis, two systematic reviews, a focus group study and efficacy testing in the local community and in two schools. The primary variables of interest were measures of pre-post intervention emotion ratings of anger, sadness, and frustration. C.O.P.E was found to be efficacious in reducing negative emotions, with moderate to strong effect sizes.

Natasha Dorè

Redacted: An Investigation into the Psychology of Censorship

The right to freely express oneself is a vital component of democracy. However, articles concerned about threats to free expression are taking a prominent position in the news. Given the prevalence of censorship, it is surprising that research in the area is only just burgeoning. This thesis contributes to the literature in two ways: determining the public's attitudes towards tolerating versus restricting speech, and how perceived motives behind someone's behaviour can influence a person to censor them. The work provides evidence that most people are tolerant of speech they disagree with, yet perceived negative motives contribute to decisions involving censorship.

Dijana Maree Dragicevich

Differential Diagnosis of Pre-swallow Pooling: A Diagnostic Dilemma.

Swallowing impairment – dysphagia – is a common consequence of neurological impairment, particularly stroke. Patients can present with motor and sensory deficits, both of which can result in disordered timing of swallowing events, allowing food and fluid to enter the lungs before the airway closes. Differentiating the underlying cause of this impairment would allow for more targeted rehabilitation. This research evaluated the phenomenon of pre-swallow pooling and established that subtypes of stroke patients with dysphagia could be classified into motor and sensory-motor causes, but that our current methods used to distinguish between them are inadequate. Alternative methods of differential diagnosis are required.

Rami Bahaeldin Abdelrahman Elsayed

Dicationic Bis(triaminocyclopropenium) Salts and Diaminocyclopropenium Salts as Ionic Liquids

This thesis illustrates the synthesis and characterization of novel series of bis(triaminocyclopropenium) (BTAC) and diaminocyclopropenium (DAC) ionic liquids (ILs). Also, a series of unique crystal structures of protic solvates were synthesized. All the salts were characterized by standard techniques (NMR spectrometry and ES-MS) as well as particular physicochemical properties relevant to the ionic liquids.

Juhn Chris Pelobello Espia

Beyond Clientelism: State-Civil Society Relations in Disaster Risk Management Policymaking in the Philippines

This thesis sought to investigate state-civil society relations in disaster risk management (DRM) policymaking. Using the Philippines as a case study, it examined the extent to which civil society actors can shape policymaking outcomes and the extent to which civil society organizations' strategies, methods, and perceptions about their efficacy in working with the state are shaped by political institutions. By developing the novel concept of 'co-infiltration', the thesis sheds light on the role of civil society actors in policymaking, the exercise of agency vis-à-vis institutional constraints, and the role of external factors in the policymaking process.

Hamish Alistair Ferguson

Using field based power meter data to model track cycling performance

Track cycling events, both sprint and endurance, are focused on performance of high and medium power durations, and it is suggested, measures of peak power govern performance in the sprint and pursuit cycling events. This thesis proposes a linear model based on total least squares regression, to test these models and provide an option for coaches to see what durations are key for performance, and for sprint cyclists what types of training should be performed at a given part of a training build up. The linear model was found to be best to predict the performance for sprint, pursuit and bunch racing.

Vikash Ghildiyal

Understanding and reducing drying collapse in difficult-to-dry plantation-grown eucalypt timber

Eucalyptus plantations are one of the largest wood resources, and while they are typically primarily grown for fibre or biomass, there is an increasing interest in using this resource for solid wood products. However, timber from such short-rotation eucalyptus plantations is often 'difficult-to-dry', suffering collapse during drying. This thesis investigates potential strategies for reducing drying collapse in plantation-grown eucalypts. Tree breeding and Joule heating have been investigated as methods of reducing drying collapse in future and current eucalyptus resources, respectively. Additional potential options for preventing collapse include sap replacement as a pre-drying treatment and/or nutrient management of the plantations.

Irina Andrea Golda Lamadrid

Peacekeepers' Children: The Legal Status of, and Responsibility for, the Children Fathered and Abandoned by United Nations Peacekeepers

The thesis studies the children fathered by United Nations peacekeepers as a result of sexual exploitation and abuse perpetrated in the context of peace support operations and subsequently abandoned. The data compiled demonstrates that abandoned peacekeepers' children are not an episodic phenomenon, but it has been happening for decades. Using Haiti as a case study, the research shows the difficulty in accessing justice to obtain paternal recognition and child support. It concludes that the fathers, the United Nations, their States of nationality and the fathers' States have failed to take responsibility for the children violating their human rights.

Sophie Marie Helene Goossens

Cooperative housing: A new Kiwi dream?

The right to adequate housing is a prerequisite to the enjoyment of other human rights and contributes to both individual and collective wellbeing. One of the key elements of the right to adequate housing is affordability. The ongoing housing affordability crisis significantly compromises the realisation of this right and other human rights in Aotearoa New Zealand. This thesis suggests several law reforms to improve housing affordability in Aotearoa New Zealand, in particular the incorporation of the right to adequate housing into domestic law, amendments to the existing unit title framework, and the introduction of a rental cooperative housing model.

Hongyu Guo

Deep Learning-based Lane Change Modelling Using Connected Vehicle Data: Detection, Prediction, Safety, and Coupled Behaviour

This thesis investigates lane change (LC) behaviour utilizing connected vehicle (CV) data and deep learning algorithms. An Autoencoder-based lane change detection model is developed for robust LC identification, followed by a Transformer-based LC prediction model with improved accuracy and efficiency. The safety-critical LC is explored by introducing a novel surrogate safety measure and a reinforcement learning method to identify and model evasive behaviour. Additionally, a multi-agent recurrent reinforcement learning approach is proposed to model the coupled behaviour of the LC and the following vehicle. Future directions include investigating cooperative strategies and exploring CV data for other driving behaviours.

Morgan Helena Hodgson

Who Are We and What Are We Doing? Using the Experiences of University Educated Millennials to Understand Contemporary Neoliberal Capitalism in New Zealand.

Using interviews and memes from university educated millennials I explore the relevance of the economic concept of educated precarity in New Zealand. I conclude that university graduates in New Zealand primarily experience precarity in the housing market, rather than the labour market as is typical internationally. This enables a critical analysis of contemporary neoliberal capitalism in New Zealand which identifies poor capital intensity and market incentives as central to financial exploitation, and the entrenchment of neoliberal hegemony.

Bonnie Jennifer Humphrey

A Comparative Approach to Sustained Attention in Animals

This thesis investigates the mechanics of sustained attention, a topic not fully understood despite a century of research. It focuses on *Trite planiceps* jumping spiders and *Columba livia* pigeons. It explores how varying intervals between stimuli affect attention, confirming that shorter intervals lead to quicker attention declines in both species. It studies the effects of Δ -9-tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and methamphetamine on spiders, finding THC acts as a depressant and methamphetamine initially stimulates before reducing attention. The research suggests an alternative receptor to cannabinoids, TRPA1, that may explain THC's behavioural effects. The work contributes to understanding sustained attention's biological underpinnings and interspecies comparisons.

Zubia Ishrat

Frequency reuse planning with directional relay links in utility field area network

This research addresses frequency planning and design for a private two-hop utility field area network with a narrow spectrum, cost-effective infrastructure, and a high density of user equipment. A unique concept of frequency reuse with the deployment of higher-order sectorization at base stations (BSs) together with directional antennas at relay nodes is presented and analysed in this thesis. The key novelty is that we systematically remove common idealist assumptions such as hexagonal, concentric circular cellular layout, uniform BS spacing, and flat terrain. This moves us closer to frequency planning for real terrain and deployments.

Shang Jiang

AI-based Traffic Management for Urban Networks: Partitioning, Perimeter Control and Route Guidance

In today's urban environments, transportation access is crucial. However, rapid development has caused a surge in vehicle numbers, resulting in significant traffic challenges that impact economic development, safety, efficiency, and the environment. Despite extensive research effort, urban traffic management remains inefficient. This thesis leverages advanced artificial intelligence techniques, such as graph convolutional neural networks, AI-integrated model predictive control, and multi-agent deep reinforcement learning, to develop enhanced traffic monitoring and management frameworks aimed at mitigating network-level urban traffic congestion. The corresponding numerical tests demonstrate the efficacy of these methods in reducing congestion and improving mobility efficiency.

Luckmore Kadzungura

Computational Modeling of 3D Printed Porous Media for Process Engineering

Triply Periodic Minimal Surface (TPMS) structures are computationally modeled for process engineering applications, focusing on Schoen Gyroid, Schwarz Primitive, and Schwarz Diamond surfaces in the OpenFOAM environment using the Finite Volume Method. The study explores their impact on separation, heat exchange, Volume Method. The study explores their impact on separation, heat exchange, and fluid flow management through simulations of pressure drop, heat transfer, and adsorption, backed by experimental validation. It highlights the potential of TPMS structures in enhancing process engineering efficiency and sustainability.

Stephanie Theresia June Kaefer

Antarctic English Lexis: A Mixed-Methods Investigation of its Development and Formation.

Isolated communities which speak different varieties of the same language can experience disrupted transmission and diffusion processes resulting in rapid language changes known as contact-induced language change or new dialect formation. This thesis explores the effects of an intensified high-contact scenario caused by the isolated, confined, and extreme conditions of Antarctica on the stability and formation of specific lexical items that have emerged there. The presence of distinct lexical items tentatively suggests there might be potential lexicons for the United States Antarctic Program and the British Antarctic Survey which showed diffusion between Antarctic stations if there were transport links connecting them.

Humayun Khan

Visual-Inertial First Responder Localisation in Large-Scale Indoor Training Environments

Determining the position and heading of first responders undertaking training is crucial for evaluating their decision making. Traditional indoor tracking systems need extensive active infrastructure installation, making them impractical to use in large-scale indoor environments. This research developed a novel sensor fusion method combining inertial and visual sensors using periodicity in the human walking motion and passive infrastructure within the environment. Our sensor fusion system achieved less than a meter of localization accuracy in large-scale indoor environments. Additionally, two energy-efficient methods are proposed, reducing energy consumption by 70%, thereby enhancing battery life for first responder training scenarios.

Helen Vivien Louise Leggatt

Burning God's Own: A Social History of Modern Cremation in New Zealand, 1874 – 1946.

Historians have long debated the reasons underlying the transition from burial to cremation that began in late-nineteenth-century Europe. Interpretations have centred on impersonal metanarratives of secularisation and modernity, or through the lives of the elite. This research redresses the balance by employing a 'history from below' perspective to explore modern cremation adoption in New Zealand through analyses of collective biographies of 4,655 individuals who chose cremation over burial. Findings problematise associations of cremation with secularisation and social status.

Vahid Loghman

Ground Motion Simulations Validation via Response of Complex Structures

This dissertation addresses a diverse range of applied aspects in ground motion simulation validation via the response of complex structures. In particular, the following topics are addressed: (i) the investigation of similarity between recorded and simulated ground motions using code-based 3D irregular structural response analysis, (ii) the development of a framework for ground motion simulations validation to identify the cause of differences between paired observed and simulated dataset, and (iii) the illustration of the process of using simulations for seismic performance-based assessment. It also provides a clear pathway for the application and adoption of simulated ground motions in engineering practice.

Jamin Luke Bruce Martin

Magneto-optical properties of lanthanide doped nanocrystals

Lanthanide-doped nanocrystals, focusing on KY_3F_{10} , were investigated using high-resolution laser spectroscopy and Zeeman infrared absorption techniques. Notably, analysis of Zeeman spectra revealed that magnetic isotropy provides crucial insights into the crystal field and can improve crystal-field models even in high-symmetry materials. Energy transfer dynamics in samarium-doped KY_3F_{10} were also studied and were found to be governed by a dipole-quadrupole mechanism. It was also much faster than in other comparable host crystals, owing to the crystal structure. Y_2SiO_5 microcrystals were also grown for quantum information processing, with the sol-gel synthesis method shown to produce high-quality crystals and desirable optical properties.

Cameron George McErlich

Evaluating extreme precipitation within extra-tropical cyclones over the Southern Hemisphere

Precipitation extremes are examined within extra-tropical cyclones across the Southern Hemisphere. When cyclones are in a phase of strengthening, extreme precipitation occurs more often. The spatial extent of extreme precipitation is more constrained around the cyclone centre compared to moderate precipitation. Vertical uplift and atmospheric instability are connected to this cyclonic precipitation. A framework for assessing precipitation based on how often it rains identifies a strong relationship between the frequency of wet days and the intensity of precipitation on those days. Linked to atmospheric processes such as vertical uplift, it suggests the drivers of precipitation are universal.

Fazeela Mohamed Ellwood

Access to primary healthcare and ambulatory care sensitive hospitalisations in the Maldives

This study examined access to primary healthcare (PHC) services in the Maldives, focusing on trust in PHC providers, transportation satisfaction, and travel time, and its association with the risk of ambulatory care-sensitive hospitalisations (ACSH). It identified the significant role of trust in determining access to PHC, while transportation and travel time were not statistically significant. Contrary to the hypothesis, low self-reported PHC access did not correlate with an increased ACSH risk. Instead, the presence of diabetes, chronic heart failure, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, and asthma; past PHC experience; PHC availability; trust in the PHC provider; and transportation satisfaction were pivotal.

Shinae Maree Montie

Marine Heatwave Impacts On New Zealand Algal Populations And Their Associations With Epibiota

Marine heatwaves (MHW), superimposed on gradual ocean warming, can have profound impacts on coastal marine organisms, especially seaweed foundation species that directly and indirectly support coastal communities. This thesis advanced critical knowledge gaps surrounding MHW trends and ecological impacts across benthic marine communities by first, quantifying MHW trends across seasons and coastal biogeographical zones, the latter characterised by high productivity, diversity, and socioeconomic values. Second, determining long-term ecological legacies from MHWs on coastal communities and third, examining how cryptic but abundant macro and microfauna, that depend on seaweeds, are affected by MHWs, resulting in wide-ranging consequences on surrounding food-webs.

Felicity Lydia Morton-Turner

Examination of the Effectiveness and Fidelity of a Parent-led Emergent Literacy Intervention

Literacy is the key to communication and is an essential skill required to live a fulfilling and meaningful life. The early years of literacy learning lay the important foundations for later development of formal literacy skills. The studies in this thesis address the need to better understand the emergent literacy skills and home literacy environments of 3- and 4-year-old children accessing early childhood education in Aotearoa, New Zealand. A parent-led intervention is trialled and its effectiveness for strengthening children's emergent literacy knowledge and strengthening families home literacy environments is reported on.

Youri Oh

Muslim migrants' food consumption practices in non-Muslim majority countries: Case studies of Australia and the UK

The thesis explores Muslim migrants' food consumption practices in non-Muslim majority countries, using Australia and the UK as case studies. While religion has a significant impact on their food practice, the thesis demonstrates that post-migration halal food consumption is a complex practice influenced by factors other than religion. Using a mixed-method approach, the thesis explores valuable insights into Muslim migrants' post-migration food consumption and the relationship between key concepts. By offering novel perspectives, this study provides significant contributions to the existing literature, enhancing our comprehension of the complex nature of religiously affiliated migrants' food consumption practices.

Alaa Abdelmawgoud Mohamed Sayed Ahmed Omar

Modular Multilevel Converters for Electric Vehicle Applications

The increasing focus and global support for the transition to electric vehicle traction systems drive rapid advancements in electric vehicle technologies. One essential component of electric vehicles is the main traction converter, which controls the power flow and drives the electric motor. This research studies the utilisation of the modular multilevel converter as a central traction converter in electric vehicles. The investigation provides an optimal and reliable converter integration to achieve multiple functions in the electric vehicle system.

Tufulasifa'atafatafa Ova Taleni

'O le fa'atamasoali'iga a Tautai matapalapala – A soul-searching and far-reaching voyage of a Tautai' How and why effective educational leadership can advance Pacific students' learning, health and well-being?

Pacific parents, families and communities continue to be part of the art of 'lei-making' and 'fala (mat) weaving' because they want their children to be a critical part of the fabric of society. They want their children to be connected to an education system that genuinely cares about their educational needs and aspirations, that value their identities, languages and cultures, that guarantees their sense of belonging. They want to see a discourse that recognises what they know of their children, namely that they are not children at 'risk' but competent learners and learners of promise.

Joanna Marie Pascoe

The Posthuman Learner: Mothers, Monsters and Machines

Exploring transformational possibilities for posthuman pedagogy via speculative fiction and Braidotti's affirmative ethics of joy, this thesis generates new ways of knowing for learners, fostering their *potentia* as they navigate their present and future on our withering planet Earth. It is argued that despite the challenges of living through a pandemic and a cascading and compounding climate emergency, the relationality offered by a transversal alliance of humans, animals, the environment and machines can help us re-imagine our world as a zoe-geo-techno community of the new, inspiring an affirmative education that supports care, engagement, learning and endurance.

Abilash Pokhrel

Geotechnical characterization and liquefaction potential of sand-gravel mixtures

The study aimed to characterize and evaluate the liquefaction potential of sand-gravel mixtures. The shear wave velocity (V_s) and stress-controlled undrained cyclic triaxial tests were conducted on sand-gravel mixture specimens with varying degrees of gravel content (GC) and relative density (Dr). Experimental results confirmed that both GC and Dr have marginal to significant effects on the V_s and liquefaction resistance of SGM and highlighted the need to consider GC and Dr effects together. The use of the intergrain state concept and energy dissipation approach were found to be suitable approaches to describe the combined effect of GC and Dr on CRR as they provide unique correlations for SGM.

Wenxin Quan

Understanding the Effects of Critical Reading Skills on Reading Comprehension among Chinese University English Language Learners

Critical reading is a high level of comprehension, where readers engage actively in deep thinking by using various types of comprehension skills. This study examined the relationships between critical reading skills and reading comprehension across languages (Chinese L1 and English L2). The results indicated bi-directional Chinese-English cross-language transfer effects between critical reading and reading comprehension. Such bi-directional transfer across different orthographies is a crucial step in supporting elements of the linguistic interdependence hypothesis and our understanding of the processes involved in performing relatively complex reading tasks, such as in university education contexts. The findings can also contribute information to language educators.

Siddarth Raajasekar

Down regulation of interferon- γ activation by macrophage antioxidant 7,8-dihydroneopterin

This thesis explores the role of 7,8-dihydroneopterin in regulating inflammatory responses in atherosclerotic plaques, with a focus on Th1 cell-mediated immune responses and interferon- γ induced activation of human macrophages. The compound 7,8-dihydroneopterin exhibits anti-atherogenic effects by reducing neopterin and kynurenine levels, modulating the cyclohydrolase-I and IDO enzymes. Optimal concentration at 200 μ M decreases inflammation in peripheral blood mononuclear cells (PBMCs). However, it has varied effects on different cell types and plaque sections. In stroke patients, elevated neopterin, total neopterin, and 7,8-dihydroneopterin levels indicate increased oxidative stress. IL-1 β levels show no significant difference, suggesting other factors influence cardiovascular disease inflammation.

Kiran Prakash Rangwani

Implementation of Friction GripNGGrab (Tension-Only) Devices in Seismic Steel Rocking Frames

This research explores the implementation and design of a novel “frictional GripNGGrab (GNG)” tension-only device in a self-centering steel rocking frame through numerical and experimental investigations. The GNG device consists of a ratcheting mechanism and sliding frictional energy dissipator. Numerical results show the significance of GNG devices, gravity, and beam-slab effects on the rocking frame’s lateral strength, with implications for design ductility. The study proposes an improved displacement prediction method, highlighting the effectiveness of GNG devices. Challenges, like variable frictional resistance forces, are discussed. Full-scale tests confirm the device’s successful performance, suggesting valuable

design insights for New Zealand’s industry, especially in seismic-resistant structures.

Sairusi Ratulomai

Contemporary organisational culture and competitive Advantage: The case of the Crusaders Super Rugby Franchise

This thesis examines the profound impact of organisational culture (OC) within a sports entity. Amidst the broad OC landscape, this study strategically focuses on five key pillars – organisational values, resilience, innovation, and diversity – exploring their contribution to the organization’s competitive advantage. Utilising a case study approach centered on the Crusaders Super Rugby franchise, the research employs qualitative, inductive, and interpretivist methodologies for a deeper engagement. Framed by Anthony Giddens’ structuration theory, the study’s insights transcend the sports realm, providing valuable lessons and enriched understanding that are applicable to diverse organisational contexts.

Simon John Reid

Novel 3D-Printed Catalysts for Hydrogen Peroxide-Powered Spaceflight

Hydrogen peroxide (HTP) is a ‘green’ rocket propellant, i.e. relatively non-toxic compared to hydrazine. However, catalysts traditionally used for HTP decomposition are expensive and inefficient. This thesis explores how new structures manufactured via 3D-printing could significantly improve catalyst performance. The Schoen Gyroid (historically difficult to manufacture) was nominated as a suitable structure. Its theoretical performance was then validated by conducting thruster tests with a platinum catalyst supported on various 3D-printed ceramic structures. Compared to traditional geometries, the Gyroid catalysts had reduced pressure drop, improved decomposition efficiency, and faster response time, endorsing their adoption in HTP thrusters.

Xin Ren

The Story Must be Told: Exploring University Students' Learning Experience during the COVID-19 Pandemic

The thesis explores COVID-19's impact on university students' well-being and learning through three interconnected studies, utilizing an online questionnaire integrating qualitative and quantitative approaches. It examines academic stress, coping strategies, belongingness, learning-related emotions, and burnout. Thematic analysis reveals eight sources of academic stress and three coping strategies. Proactive problem-solving and seeking assistance emerge as effective coping mechanisms. Mediation analysis shows that stronger belonging facilitates effective coping and enhances learning enjoyment, reducing burnout risk. The thesis underscores the importance of addressing students' well-being and learning experience, offering practical implications for stakeholders in transitioning to online/hybrid learning and fostering inclusive practices post-pandemic.

Heidi Jane Roberts

Inclusive Practice in Mathematics: The Influence of Policy and Assessment on Teaching Mathematics in New Zealand Primary Schools

This qualitative multiple-case study delves into how mathematics is taught and comprehended by teachers within New Zealand's primary schools. The study revealed that New Zealand mathematics education is structured horizontally (by content) and vertically (by year or level). The study also highlights an emphasis on the number content area, leading to the formation of ability groups based on assessment data, which can impact students' access to mathematical concepts. Operating within this complex ecosystem influenced by policy, assessments, and the school curriculum, teachers' perceptions of student learning needs are shaped and impact the promotion of inclusive teaching practices in mathematics.

Alexander Safonov

Non-collaborative behaviour in the associational tourism economy

The associational tourism economy relies on collaborative efforts, forming networks, clusters, and ecosystems. While collaboration is crucial for success, non-collaborative behaviour remains under studied. This research investigates various perspectives on non-collaboration within the tourism economy in New Zealand, identifying factors such as resource constraints, socio-cultural differences, professional factors, and value-related issues. Recognising non-collaborative behaviour as an intrinsic part of tourism business operations is crucial for stakeholders, as efforts to eliminate it may disrupt policy effectiveness and association strategies. Furthermore, collaboration in tourism should extend beyond marketing and address diverse aspects. Effective collaboration requires governments and industry associations to understand and embrace non-collaborative behaviour, fostering resilient tourism ecosystems.

Sam Darren Schofield

Visual-Inertial Odometry for Windblown Vegetated Environments

Drones can be used to revolutionise the forestry and arboriculture industries by automating tree pruning tasks. A significant challenge currently preventing these applications is an inability to accurately estimate the drone's position in environments full of windblown vegetation, like forests. Methods like GPS aren't accurate enough, while more precise methods, like visual odometry, aren't reliable in environments dominated by scene motion. This work takes several steps towards remedying the latter problem by improving existing ground truth and dataset generation techniques for visual odometry and proposing a novel outlier detection technique that significantly improves visual odometry performance in dynamic scenes.

Simone Lydia Schwoerer

Criminalising Cartel Conduct in New Zealand

This thesis investigates the justification for criminalising cartels in New Zealand, focusing on the effectiveness of the civil cartel law and the implications of criminalisation. Assessing cases from 2004 to 2022 against international standards, it finds the civil regime effective, with a robust detection system, adequate investigative powers, significant awareness efforts and impactful sanctions. Subsequently, the analysis questions the need for criminalisation, emphasising that its introduction may not enhance the law's effectiveness. Drawing insights from the United Kingdom and Australia, the study proposes strategies for the New Zealand regulator to navigate the challenges of the dual regime.

Jeganenthiran Sellathurai

Periodised Strength and Conditioning for Short-Sprint Athletes in Sri Lanka: A Mixed-Methods Study

The research has mainly focused on periodised strength and conditioning (PSC) for short-sprint athletes in Sri Lanka; a developing country. The first explorative study revealed that coaches reported minimal or inadequate knowledge of periodised training, including prescribing strength and speed training. Given the inadequate knowledge, Study 2 examined the impact of 24-weeks of PSC while Study 3 assessed the coach and athlete perceptions of the PSC programme concurrently with Study 2. Study 2 showed significant improvements in all tests ($p < 0.05$) compared to Non-periodised, while Study 3 confirmed the programme's applicability. As such, Study 4 sought to investigate the impact of a formal coach education (CE) setting and finding revealed that knowledge acquired through the CE programme influenced coaches' coaching practices.

Trisha Mary Stubbings

"I don't really care what they do, as long as they write". Exploring writing beliefs and practices of years 5-8 primary school teachers.

This study used an exploratory sequential design to investigate New Zealand upper primary school teachers' beliefs and influences related to writing instruction. Findings from this research demonstrated that teachers primarily espouse constructivist philosophies about writing, and were found to be highly focused on student engagement in writing, rather than writing achievement. Writing was articulated as a complex skill to teach in comparison to other curriculum areas and these findings highlight the need for greater teacher support and structure in writing instruction and the need for teacher-led, specific strategy instruction and content knowledge about writing.

Alexander Leslie Sutherland

'Becoming 'Nestorian Crosses': A Study of the Collecting of the Bronze Ordos Crosses, Their Iconography and Materiality'

This thesis examines the bronzes commonly known as Nestorian crosses following their discovery in northern China in 1929. In response to concerns about this identification in recent research, this thesis examines the role of particular historical and cultural contexts and perspectives in classifying the bronzes. An analysis of medieval Christian, Mongolian, Tibetan, and Chinese material culture highlights the influence of cross-cultural exchange on the manufacture of the bronzes. As a result, this thesis recontextualises the discussion on Nestorian crosses within medieval and early twentieth century cross-cultural interactions between East and West and their influence on art history in China.

Liam James Sycamore

Development of real-time model-based Rocket Navigation Algorithms

Since 2009 UC Rocketry has developed substantial GNC capabilities for sounding rockets and orbital vehicles. These capabilities formed the research foundation for the GNC system on Rocket Lab's orbital vehicle Electron. This thesis significantly extends UC Rocketry's GNC capabilities by development of a complete six degree-of-freedom orbital vehicle navigation system. Minimal models are developed for vehicle sensors using an iterative integral based real-time identification algorithm. In addition, an iterative analytical modelling method is introduced which in combination with the integral method opens up the potential for the use of MEMS lower-cost sensors for navigation in the orbital rocket industry.

Wei Kann Tan

I'm a (State)-Chinese: A Comparative Study of Identity Formation in the Chinese Youth of Singapore, Malaysia, the Philippines and Taiwan

Questions have often been asked of the identity and political loyalty of Chinese communities that exist throughout East Asia. With the PRC's rise to power and its insistence that all Chinese share a singular heritage and motherland, there is renewed interest in this debate. It is in this context that the local Chinese communities around the region have started to differentiate themselves, emphasising a hybrid political identity that is state-ethnic. This thesis aims to answer the question of how the local Chinese form this state-Chinese identity by using Q-methodology to study the Chinese youth in Singapore, Malaysia, the Philippines and Taiwan.

Lynda Maree Taylor

Leading the transition to innovative learning environments: insights from practice for principals

This thesis examines how two principals have led the transition from traditional to innovative learning environments, emphasising the crucial link between leadership and learning. Using a qualitative case study methodology, data is collected through principal and leadership team interviews. In addition, a sample of teachers are interviewed at each site, alongside researcher observations and document analysis. The thesis proposes a change leadership model, using a windmill metaphor, comprising four blades revolving around a central hub (the students). Each blade represents actions for principals to initiate, implement and embed change in response to the reality of their change contexts (the unexpected winds).

Nidhi Tewari

Emerging Privacy Concerns in the Context of Digital Profiles and AI-driven Decision Making

In today's tech-centric era, organisations gather vast data and use AI for decision-making. This raises privacy concerns about individuals' digital profiles and AI-driven decision-making which lacks human involvement. This study investigates these concerns amidst privacy protection measures like laws and policies, whose efficacy remains unclear. Using a positivist approach, the study deploys mixed-methods research and identifies 11 privacy concern dimensions. The study also explores an interplay among privacy protection mechanisms, trust, risk, privacy concerns, and outcomes, offering valuable insights for information systems theory and practical applications.

Minh Tuan Tran

Magic Weapon Versus Magic Shield: China's United Front Work Efforts in Vietnam

The thesis investigates the Chinese Communist Party's (CCP) united front work in Vietnam since 1991. It evaluates the impact of CCP strategies, analyzes CCP-VCP relations, and assesses Vietnam's defense mechanisms. Employing Professor Anne-Marie Brady's "Magic Weapons" framework, it examines China's united front work in Vietnam using qualitative analysis of Vietnamese, Chinese, and English sources. The study reveals CCP's utilization of various tactics, including targeting elites and influencing media, while acknowledging unique aspects of Sino-Vietnamese relations. These findings enrich understanding of CCP's united front work and Vietnam's resilience. The research underscores the significance of these dynamics in Vietnam's politics and offers avenues for future exploration.

Pablo Ariel Wainschenker

Notes from the backyard: Representations of Antarctica in narratives from Argentina and Chile (1886-2023)

By analysing Antarctic narratives by Argentinean and Chilean authors, this thesis shows that, beyond nationalistic discourse, little-known works with other thematic concerns also exist. These narratives challenge the assumption that nationalism is the only South American way of literary engagement with the icy continent and show that Antarctic stories are an arena of symbolic disputes. Additionally, the thesis explores the relationship between a dominant Anglophone representation of Antarctica and South American narratives, revealing points of intersection and disparities, including among the latter the assumption, in the Anglophone imagination, of spatial and symbolic separation between Antarctica and the rest of the world.

Hailong Wang

Control of Grid-side Converter for Type-IV Wind Turbine Connected to AC Systems.

This thesis presents an innovative synchronized approach to the grid-connected voltage source converter with an AC system. It provides a comprehensive uniform expression for arbitrary three-phase signals, incorporating their instantaneous magnitude and phase. Stability analysis, conducted through Lyapunov theory, confirms the system's convergence to the desired equilibrium point asymptotically. Simulation results validate the superiority of the proposed control scheme over traditional methods under diverse grid conditions. Consequently, this research significantly advances the adaptability of grid-side converters, promising impactful applications for future power systems.

Raana Zahmatkesh

Towards more equal participation of women in Aotearoa New Zealand's judiciary: A case for gender-sensitive policies in the judicial appointment process

Women are under-represented in the New Zealand judiciary. Although the percentage of women judges has improved over time, in 2021, 60% of judges in New Zealand were still men. Scholars have paid little attention to the complex reasons for the unequal representation of women in the New Zealand judiciary. In this thesis, it is argued that the judicial appointment processes perpetuate the unequal proportion of women judges. I recommend modifying the appointment processes by taking a systemic approach to address the interconnected issues discussed in this thesis.

Shayan Zarakhsh

Airbnb Consumers' Notions of Responsibility and Cooperation: An Integrative Framework of NAM and SDT

Airbnb's negative economic, social, and environmental impacts are well acknowledged in the literature. Despite the proliferation of research attempting to understand tourists' socio-environmentally responsible behaviours with a view to improve tourism sustainability, such endeavour is hardly evident in Airbnb research. Drawing on an integrative theoretical framework of norm activation model (NAM) and social dilemma theory (SDT), and using an exploratory sequential mixed-methods approach, this study reveals how Airbnb consumers' (guests) awareness of the negative impacts of Airbnb influences their responsibility and intention to cooperate in mitigating these impacts. Theoretical and practical implications are provided.



The tradition of graduation

University graduation ceremonies are part of a tradition stretching back to the 12th century when the first universities appeared in Europe. Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha | University of Canterbury, established as Canterbury College in 1873, was based on the English Oxbridge model and its graduation ceremonies follow that tradition while incorporating elements of tikanga Māori.

The first Canterbury degrees were conferred in 1878 in the Canterbury Provincial Chambers. The ceremonies moved to the College Hall, after its completion in 1882, known as the Great Hall at the original university campus, now home to the Christchurch Arts Centre.

The early graduation ceremonies, known as Diploma Days, were decorous affairs but by 1884 discordant notes sounded in the form of 'tooting on a very unmusical instrument'. Clashes between exuberant graduands and the ceremonial party developed, and capping ceremonies were briefly replaced by a college function before an agreed format was reached whereby short speeches and songs were alternated.

Graduation ceremonies were not held during the First World War but when they resumed in 1921, banter, songs and interjections interrupted proceedings and the College resorted to mailing out diplomas and arranging only a reception for graduates. By 1930 the ceremony had returned to a quieter, more orderly proceeding.

Pressure of numbers forced a move in 1946 to the Civic Theatre, the first year an academic procession through the city was held. This format continued, apart from three occasions when it was held in the St James Theatre, until 1962 when further growth of numbers prompted a move to King Edward Barracks.

In 1968 the ceremony was divided into morning and evening proceedings and in 1971 it was made voluntary.

The Christchurch Town Hall became the venue in 1973 and a further change to three afternoon ceremonies was made in 1987. Four ceremonies became necessary in 1994, growing further in 1997 to five ceremonies; four in autumn and one in summer.

Recent decades have seen a resurgence in the popularity of graduation with steadily increasing numbers of students choosing to receive their degrees in person.

As a result of the merger between the University and the Christchurch College of Education on 1 January 2007, the number of graduation ceremonies continued to increase and included one held in Rotorua.

In the aftermath of the February 2011 earthquake, the April 2011 Graduate Celebrations were held in a marquee on Ilam Fields, and then moved to Christchurch Arena. April 2019 saw ceremonies return to the fully restored Christchurch Town Hall for the first time since the earthquakes almost 10 years earlier. In 2022 graduation celebrations moved back to the Christchurch Arena to allow for the growing numbers of graduates and their guests.

Graduation celebrations today

Today, the University opts for graduation celebrations instead of traditional ceremonies. This change stems from the University Council's practice of verifying and endorsing the qualification requirements of graduating students before the celebration, a formal process called conferral – the legal awarding of the qualification. Since conferral occurs before graduation, we refer to the event as a celebration rather than a ceremony.

The celebration begins with a procession of the graduates led by a piper to the door of the auditorium. Once the graduates are seated, fanfare from the organ heralds the entry into the auditorium of the academic party led by the Esquire or Madam Bedel, a ceremonial role, carrying the University mace, the symbol of institutional authority. The banner bearers follow, then academic and professional staff, followed by the Deans, then members of the University Council and the three Officers of the University, Tumu Kaunihera | Chancellor, Tumu Whakarae | Vice-Chancellor and Pourouki Registrar. The mace rests on a stand during the celebration.

Today's UC Graduation celebrations include elements of tikanga Ngāi Tahu. A representative group of graduates is welcomed into the auditorium with pao (a call of welcome), and this is responded to by the kaikaranga (caller) leading the group in. This exchange of karanga between senior Ngāi Tahu women opens the proceedings.

The pao is followed with a mihi or speech of welcome, from a Ngāi Tahu man, and that in turn is followed with a waiata. In this small way the University honours its relationship with mana whenua, Ngāi Tūāhuriri, its commitment to bicultural development, and its responsibilities under Te Tiriti o Waitangi. The Treaty of Waitangi.

After the National Anthem te Tumu Kaunihera Chancellor opens the proceedings with the words: "I now convene a ceremony of the University of Canterbury to celebrate our graduates on the completion of their certificates, diplomas and degrees."

Te Tumu Kaunihera | Chancellor then hands over to te Tumu Tuarua Akoranga | Deputy Vice-Chancellor Academic who introduces te Amo Rangahau | Dean of Postgraduate Research and Ngā Amo | Deans of the Faculties, who in turn present the graduates.

When all graduates have been capped and collected their testamur (certificate) there is a short speech before all in attendance rise and sing *Gaudeamus*. The academic party then leaves the auditorium, followed by the graduates.

The Bedel and the mace



At each ceremony the procession of graduates and staff is led by the Esquire or Madam Bedel carrying the University mace, the symbol of institutional authority. Historically the Bedel had a number of functions but in a modern university only the ceremonial role at graduation survives.

Used for every graduation ceremony since 1957, the University of Canterbury's mace provides a tangible link with the College of Christ Church at Oxford University, where it was designed and made. The shaft of the mace is made of an oak beam removed from Tom Tower when the bell was rehung in 1953. Even in 1680, when the beam was installed in the Sir Christopher Wren-designed Tower, the timber was described as 'well-seasoned'.

There is a *tohu* Māori (Māori design) carved on the shaft between two silver ferrules. The silver bowl at the head of the mace is joined to the staff by a fluted silver collar and ends in a Tudor rose. The petals embrace the coat of arms of Canterbury University College, executed in coloured enamel. Engraved at the foot of the mace is the Cardinal's Hat of Christ Church.

Coat of Arms

The formal, heraldic description of the University of Canterbury's coat of arms reads: "Murrey a Fleece Argent in base a Plough on a Chief wavy Or an open Book proper bound Murrey edged and clasped Or between a Pall Azure charged with Four Crosses Formy Fitchy Or and a Cross Flory Azure".

The base of the shield comprises a silver fleece, symbolising the province's pastoral pursuits, and a golden plough, symbolising agriculture, set on a murrey-coloured (purple-red, derived from mulberry) shield. The murrey-coloured, golden clasped book in the centre of the top section symbolises learning. On its right (observer's left) is an azure bishop's pall charged with four golden crosses, and on its left is an azure cross. The two crosses symbolise the province's ecclesiastical connections. The wavy line separating the two sections represents lands overseas.

The coat of arms, approved and authorised by the British Kings of Arms in Letters Patent dated 10 May 1965, was based on an earlier unauthorised version which was in turn adapted from the Canterbury Provincial Government's arms of the 19th century. That earlier Coat of Arms is still visible on the clock tower and above the entrance of the Arts Centre on the corner of Hereford Street and Rolleston Avenue.

A brief history of the University



Canterbury College was the second university institution in Aotearoa New Zealand when it was established as a constituent college of the University of New Zealand in 1873.

Housed in graceful stone buildings on a central city block the College was supported by rents from high country reserves, endowed by the Canterbury Provincial Council for this purpose.

It was modelled on English and Scottish universities, but with one major difference; the three foundation professors admitted women to the College from the beginning.

In 1876, Helen Connon became the first woman to study at the university, then known as Canterbury College. Connon graduated with a BA in 1880 – the second woman arts graduate in the British Empire. When she gained her MA with first-class honours in English and Latin in 1881, she became the first woman in the British Empire to be awarded a degree with honours.

Lord Ernest Rutherford, one of our most distinguished graduates, studied at Canterbury College in the 1890s and discovered his scientific ability during two years of postgraduate research before taking up a scholarship to Cambridge University.



Tā Āpirana Ngata of Ngāti Porou graduated from Canterbury College in 1893 with a BA in political science. Tā Apirana was the first Māori graduate from any university in Aotearoa New Zealand.

Bessie Te Wenerau Grace (Ngāti Tūwharetoa) was the first Māori woman to graduate from university. She graduated from Canterbury College in 1926 with a BA and went on to complete an MA with first-class honours in modern languages from the University of London.

Today, the portraits of Lord Rutherford and Tā Āpirana grace the nation's \$100 and \$50 bank notes, respectively, while suffragist Kate Sheppard features on the \$10 note. She attended Canterbury College's School of Fine Arts as a student in 1882 and 1883. Her former home, Te Whare Waiutuutu Kate Sheppard House, nestles beside the modern University's Ilam campus.

The institute became known as Canterbury University College in 1933 before assuming the title of the University of Canterbury in 1957.

Faced with increasing space pressures, it was decided in 1949 to transfer the University, in stages, to a new campus on farmland bought for the purpose in what became the suburb of Ilam. Between 1960 and 1974, a time of rapid growth, the University was split between its town and Ilam campuses. After the town site was vacated in 1975, it was donated to the city of Ōtautahi Christchurch and is now home to the Arts Centre.

The University has returned, in part, to its former site, with Classics and the School of Music moving to the former Chemistry building in the Arts Centre. It includes the Teece Museum of Classical Antiquities, which houses the Logie Collection of Greek and Roman antiquities.

Following the earthquakes of 2010–2011, the University undertook significant redevelopment providing modern, cutting-edge facilities.

The modern University occupies attractively landscaped 76-hectare campuses in Ilam and Upper Riccarton comprising libraries, lecture theatres, laboratories, halls of residence and a range of student services surrounded by playing fields, woodlands and the renowned Ilam Gardens.

As well as the innovative, purpose-built facilities on campus, the University operates several major field stations, including: the Cass Mountain Research Area, Kawatiri Westport Field Station, Ōtehiwai Mt John Observatory. The most remote field station is located in Nigeria, at the edge of the diverse and ecologically important Ngel Nyaki Forest Reserve.

Academic dress



The various types of academic dress worn by graduates have evolved from the daily dress worn by university students and staff in the Middle Ages, which in turn was based on the attire worn by the medieval clergy.

Gowns and hoods were practical wear in those days and while the gown is still worn by some, the hood has become purely ceremonial. The colour of the lining of the hood is strictly controlled and indicates the wearer's university and faculty or degree. The rich variety of academic dress worn by the academic staff reflects the many universities represented; the dress of American and European universities differs markedly from that of Commonwealth universities.

The gowns for Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha University of Canterbury bachelor's and master's degrees are the same as for the Cambridge Bachelor and Master of Arts; the gown for the Doctor of Philosophy degree is as for the Cambridge Master of Arts but with peony red detachable facings for dress occasions.

The hoods are of a standard size and shape with a slate grey exterior. The colour of the lining indicates the degree of the wearer.

The headgear for a bachelor's and a master's degree is a black trencher (mortarboard) with tassel. For all Doctoral degrees the headgear is a black bonnet as for the University of St Andrews.

University Officers wear peony red gowns. Te Tumu Kaunihera | Chancellor's is damask embroidered with gold and gold lace and the trencher is peony red with gold lace and a gold tassel. Te Tumu Whakarae | Vice-Chancellor's gown is damask embroidered with gold and the trencher is peony red with a gold tassel. Te Pouroki | Registrar's gown is silk embroidered with gold and the trencher is peony red with a peony red tassel.

Degree colours



The colour of the lining indicates the degree of the wearer.

The colours are:

- Arts – Baby Pink
- Commerce – Yellow
- Education – Brown
- Engineering – Violet
- Forestry – Chestnut
- Health Sciences – Emerald Green
- Law & Criminal Justice – Ice Blue
- Music & Fine Arts – White
- Science – Ultramarine
- Social Work – Post Office Red
- Speech & Language Pathology/Audiology – Magenta
- Sport Coaching – Post Office Red
- Teaching & Learning – Old Gold
- PhDs – Peony Red

Honours and master's degrees are distinguished by a border of colour on the exterior of the hood: for an honours degree it is 25mm wide, for a master's degree it is 75mm.

For the Doctor of Philosophy degree, the hood is lined in peony red. For the other doctorates the hood is slate grey.

Graduate Women Canterbury



Graduate Women Canterbury (GWC) is the Trust which is responsible for the non-profit organisation, GWC Regalia Hire. Together, both entities focus on further tertiary education for New Zealand women, with the proceeds from the Regalia Hire used to finance scholarships and awards.

Since 2020 the Trust has partnered directly with UC and other Canterbury tertiary institutions to fund new and existing initiatives in support of women entering, completing and working in tertiary education.

The Canterbury Branch of New Zealand Federation of University Women was originally formed in the 1920s to support women graduates socially and professionally in a time where women tertiary students and graduates were a significant minority.

GWC is here to create opportunities, and to encourage and support equity within tertiary education and beyond.
