Get ahead in summer

University of Canterbury | Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha (UC) offers a selection of courses in a range of subjects over summer (November – February).

Why study over summer?

Summer study gives you an opportunity to get ahead by:

- shortening the time it takes to complete your degree
- enabling you to catch up after taking introductory courses during the year, or retaking courses you failed or withdrew from
- spreading your workload
- choosing an interest or specialist course
- improving your academic skills, or
- picking up prerequisite courses to prepare you for your chosen courses next semester.

If eligible, you can receive StudyLink assistance over summer.

Due to their intensive nature, summer courses at degree-level are not recommended if you are new to university study. The transition courses on the next page are designed for new UC students.

Enrol for January 2019

From 2 October, you can also enrol for 2019 courses starting in January (19SU1).

Important dates

If you were not enrolled at UC this year, the last date to apply to enrol is one week prior to the official start date of the summer course.

Current students can add a summer course to their enrolment by submitting a change of enrolment up to the first Friday after the official start date, for a course of less than six weeks duration; or the second Friday after the official course start date for a course of six weeks or longer. Teaching practices and field trips enrolment dates vary.

Students studying over summer who are not currently enrolled at UC will pay a compulsory Student Services Levy in addition to course fees. The amount of the levy will depend on the length of enrolment.

Workload and expectations

Most summer courses have an intensive teaching format. This condensed teaching and assessment schedule requires your full commitment if you are to successfully complete your summer course. For this reason, we recommend that you take no more than two courses (up to 30–60 points) during the summer. For workload reasons, we recommend that you spread your courses across the November and January sessions rather than enrolling in two courses in one session. Due to the timeframes for summer courses, it is often not possible to be as generous with extensions as it is for semester courses.

Transition courses

These courses are non-credit, catch-up courses that can help prepare you for your first year of degree study.

- Our Headstart pre-university catch-up programme is suitable for students who have University Entrance, and would like to prepare for a subject to meet programme prerequisites, or for students who have been away from study for a while, to refresh knowledge, skills, and confidence.

Linen can be hired for \$15 per week (2 x towels, 2 x sheets, pillow, duvet) or for longer stays, full bedding packs including towels and linen can be purchased at a one-off charge of \$125.

Discounted rates are available for current residents.

A one-off refundable contingency fee of \$300 is applicable for stays of 28 nights or longer.

Accommodation is self-catered, however, meals will be available from time-to-time throughout summer.
